#### III. COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Dr. Lloyd Kahn, Professor of Life Science and President of the Professional Association (faculty) congratulated Professor Raffaella Pernice on her promotion to full Professor. Trustee Bakari Lee expressed the concurrence of the Board in Dr. Kahn's congratulations of Professor Pernice. Dr. Kahn then went on to express the desire of the faculty to continue with negotiations despite the fact that the union has filed a notice impasse.

Pamela Norris Littles, Associate Dean, Financial Aid and President of the Academic Administrative Association, noted that the County Board of School Estimate met and approved the county appropriation for the College earlier in the day and expressed the hope that coming to closure on the FY2013 operating budget would make it easier to move forward with negotiations.

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Dr. Eric Friedman, Academic Vice President, noted that the trustees were about to approve an Occupational Therapy Assistant Program and also a Baking and Pastry Option with the AAS Culinary Arts Program. He explained that these recommendations reflected considerable work on the part of faculty and administrators within those divisions, and he thanked them for their contributions.

Cathy Siedman, Assistant Professor Humanities, expressed her disapproval of the way the College Administration had handled communications following a violent incident adjacent to Pathside during the spring break. She also criticized the accommodations made during construction in 83-87Sip. Both instances, in her opinion, reflect a lack of caring for students and faculty.

#### REPORT/BACKGROUND;

The Hudson County Community College Health, Science, and Technology Division and Grants Department have identified a need to purchase 10 vascular system models for the science and life science labs at \$4,015.00 per unit for a grand total of \$40,150.00. To best serve HCCC students through the acquisition of instructional equipment, the HCCC Grants Office is proposing to purchase these units with Perkins Grant funding. The Perkins fiscal '12 spending plan has received final approved status from the N.J. Department of Education with this request included in the current budget.

A quote has been solicited from Ward's Natural Science of Rochester, New York, for a cost not to exceed \$40,150.00. Ward's Natural Science is a sole source vendor for the purchase of vascular system models.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The President, the Administration, and the Finance Committee recommend that the Board of Trustees approve the purchase of 10 vascular system models from Ward's Natural Science of Rochester, New York, at a total cost of \$40,150.00. This contract is grant funded.

The Perkins fiscal '12 spending plan has received final approved status from the NJDOE with this request included in the current budget.

Three (3) quotes have been solicited from M. Tucker, a division of Singer NY (\$25,016.19), LLC of Paterson, NJ; Wasserstrom (\$22,500.00, NO FREIGHT INCLUDED IN COST) Corporation of Columbus, OH; and Kitchen Restaurant Supply (\$22,397.00) of Mobile, AL.

The Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Grants Officer recommends this purchase from Kitchen Restaurant Supply of Mobile, Alabama.

#### RECOMMENDATION

#### IX. ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

#### 1. New Degree Option: Associate in Arts - Liberal Arts, Theatre Arts Option

#### REPORT/BACKGROUND

The A.A.Liberal Arts – Theatre Arts Option is designed for students who wish to transfer to a bachelor's degree or higher in the field of Theatre Arts. In addition to the foundation in liberal arts education, the curriculum provides foundation in theatre, acting, directing and playwriting (Attachment I – Program Announcement). Field trips to local/NYC theaters will be integrated into the degree program.

Hudson County Community College is one of only four New Jersey Community Colleges that does not have an established degree program or degree option in Theatre, Performing, or the Dramatic Arts. The rise in enrollment at HCCC and the continued success of the theatre arts courses being offered by the college justify the introduction of this new degree option. Students of the college also have easy access to New York City's Broadway, Off-Broadway, and off-off Broadway theatre communities, probably the most vital arts district of its kind in the world.

## **Program Announcement Narrative**

## I. Objectives

## A. Program Description

The A.A. program in Liberal Arts – Theatre Arts Option is designed for students who wish to complete a bachelor's degree or higher in the field of Theatre Arts. By offering a broadbased liberal arts curriculum with core theatre requirements, the option is ideal for students interested in all aspects of Theatre.

#### **B.** Program Objectives

The proposed Theatre Arts Option to the Associate of Arts degree program in Liberal Arts is created to prepare students for further study in the field of entertainment arts. The curriculum intentionally emphasizes a comprehensive base in liberal arts education; the foundation from which the playwright, actor and director derives most if not all of their essential philosophies. Students completing the A.A. Theatre Arts Option will have fulfilled the necessary requirements to transfer to a Bachelor's degree program at a four-year public university in New Jersey.

## C. Student Outcomes

In addition to acquiring fundamental critical thinking, problem solving, and effective communication skills, and a background of general knowledge appropriate to a student entering the junior year of college as outlined in HCCC's policy on general education, upon successful completion of this degree option, students will be able to:

- 1 Analyze how the choices made by playwrights, actors, directors, and designers help to express a play's meaning.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the basic tools necessary to approach and interpret dramatic literature for performance.
- 3. Recognize the development and historical movements that have shaped world theatre using exemplary authors and works.
- 4. Communicate how a theatrical performance is a useful tool for change within the community.
- 5. Identify areas of specialization within the theatre arts when considering a career path.

#### II. Need

#### A. Justification

Hudson County Community College is one of only four New Jersey Community Colleges that does not have an established degree program or degree option in Theatre, Performing, or the Dramatic Arts. The rise in enrollment at HCCC and the continued success of the pilot courses being offered by the college justify the introduction of this new degree option. Students of the college also have easy access to New York City's Broadway, Off-Broadway, and off-off Broadway theatre communities, arguably the most vital arts district of its kind in the world. Based on these factors we expect an initial enrollment of 12 or more students.

## B. Relationship to Institutional Mission

The addition of a Theatre Arts Option to the Associate of Arts in Liberal Arts Degree Program will resolve a weak link in Hudson County Community College's academic profile and therefore help the college fulfill its mission of being a comprehensive urban community college. In providing additional liberal arts courses in theatre the college would be able to offer a high quality program that would be both accessible and affordable to the college's student population. The curriculum intentionally emphasizes a comprehensive base in general education courses to ensure that students can think critically and analytically consistent with the college's mission. The associate degree program would prepare students to transfer to four-year colleges and universities.

#### X. NEW BUSINESS

#### 1. Resolution and Statement of Policy Concerning Project Labor Agreements

Whereas, pursuant to N.J.S.A 52:38-1, et seq., (the "PLA Statute") public entities in New Jersey are permitted to require the use of a Project Labor Agreement, on a project by project basis, in connection with contracts for the construction of a public works project where the cost of the project is \$5 million or more (exclusive of land acquisition costs) and the public entity has determined that the criteria supporting the use of a Project Labor Agreement, as set forth in the PLA Statute, have been met, and

Whereas, the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Hudson has established a policy consistent with Executive Order No.TAD -34 dated December 17, 2009, by its Resolution No.531-12-2009, whereby eligible public projects are to utilize a Project Labor Agreement whenever the PLA Statute's criteria supporting such use have been met, and

Whereas, the Board of Chosen Freeholders has recently adopted Resolution No. 196-4-2012 whereby the said Board of Chosen Freeholders urges the Board of Trustees of the Hudson County Community College formally to adopt a policy similar to that of the County of Hudson in favor of utilizing Project Labor Agreements whenever it is consistent with the PLA Statute, and

**Whereas**, the Hudson County Community College has previously followed the policy of the County of Hudson with respect to the use of Project Labor Agreements but is now desirous of formalizing its policy in that regard, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees acknowledges that the use of Project Labor Agreements will help to achieve the goals set forth in the PLA Statute by promoting labor stability and advancing the interests of the Hudson County Community College in cost efficiency, skilled labor force, quality, safety and timeliness in carrying out public works projects,

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Board of Trustees of the Hudson County Community College that:

- 1. The aforesaid recitals are incorporated into this Resolution as though fully set forth at length.
- The Board of Trustees hereby adopts a policy consistent with County Executive Order No. TAD-34 and Resolution No. 531-12-2009 of the Board of Chosen Freeholders requiring the consideration and, where appropriate under the PLA Statute, the use of Project Labor Agreements in all eligible public works projects undertaken by the Hudson County Community College.

- 3. The Secretary shall send a certified copy of this Resolution to the Hudson County Board of Chosen Freeholders.
- 4. This Resolution shall take effect immediately.
