GOLFERS BEAT THE HEAT TO RAISE MONEY FOR HCCC STUDENTS

The hot temperatures and humid weather didn't stop golfers from having a great time, posting some impressive scores, and, most importantly, raising money for a worthy cause at the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation's 22nd Annual Golf Outing.

This year's outing held on July 15, 2024, at the Forest Hill Field Club in Bloomfield, NJ, was dedicated to the memory of Philip Johnston, a longtime member of the HCCC Foundation Board of Directors who served as Chair from 2010 to 2012 and passed away in December 2023. As a member of the Forest Hill Field Club, Mr. Johnston initially secured the use of the club for the Foundation's golf outings. His company, Johnston Communications (now JC Solutions), created the College's fiber optics network during the 1990s. Mr. Johnston also served on the board of directors of the local Pioneer Boys and Girls of America, the West Hudson/South Bergen Optimist Club, and the HCCC Foundation's West Hudson Fundraising Committee.

Former Foundation Chair Monica McCormack-Casey, who worked alongside Phil for many years on the Foundation Board, characterized Phil as "both a doer and a donor." McCormack-Casey recalls her friend fondly, stating that "No matter where he went in life, Phil never forgot his Hudson

County roots. He strongly believed that 'as you walk through life, it's good to look back and give somebody a helping hand.' I don't think anything made him happier than providing a helping hand to someone in need."

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber pointed out that, "Philip Johnston's 23 years of support, generosity, and commitment to the College, our Foundation, faculty, and students is a vital part of his legacy. Proceeds from the Annual Foundation Golf Outing that he created furnish scholarships for deserving students."

HCCC CELEBRATES THE FIFTH YEAR OF THE EARLY COLLEGE PROGRAM DUAL-DEGREE GRADUATES

or the fifth straight year, Hudson County high school seniors earned Associate degrees while also attaining their high school diplomas as part of the HCCC Early College program. This year, 21 Early College students celebrated their college commencement prior to their high school graduation ceremonies. The graduates included the first-ever cohort from Bayonne High School and the fifth graduating cohort from Hudson County Schools of Technology.

HCCC Early College provides high school students with the opportunity to take up to 18 college-level credits per academic year, credits that give them a head start towards an associate degree or to transfer to other colleges. The program lessens the time and cost it takes to reach academic goals. All eligible high school students who participate in the Early College program pay only 50% of the in-county tuition rate.

Scenes from the 22nd Annual Goundation Golf Outing

Over 75 golfers participated in this year's outing and the always-anticipated event generated over \$80,000 in revenue that will provide scholarships for deserving HCCC students and contribute to the growth and development of the College. Attendees included members of the HCCC community along with business leaders from Hudson County and throughout the state. Among the golfers were a group of HCCC students, who learned and practiced the sport through a multi-week golf clinic to prepare for the event. Their participation was made possible through the generosity of donors.

HCCC Vice President for Advancement and Communications Nicole Johnson explained: "The golf course has long been where networking is done, professional connections are made, and deals are struck. Not only are our students learning how to play golf, but they are gaining

the social capital and the ability to tap into the networking opportunities that the game offers. Many of them would not have been able to take advantage of these opportunities if not for the generosity of our donors."

Established in 1997, the HCCC Foundation is a nonprofit, 501 (c)(3) corporation that provides tax-exempt status to contributions. The Foundation supports and promotes the College and its students by building awareness and developing financial resources. In keeping with its vision that all Hudson County residents should be afforded the opportunity to acquire a college education and enjoy the lifelong benefits of that education, the Foundation provides scholarships for students, seed money for new and innovative programs, stipends for faculty development, capital to assist the College in its physical expansion, and resources to address basic needs of HCCC community members

and students beyond the classroom. Since its inception, the Foundation has awarded close to \$4 million in scholarships to deserving students.

If you weren't able to make it to this year's golf outing, keep an eye out for the 23rd iteration of this annual event next summer. There are plenty of additional upcoming HCCC Foundation events that you can be a part of in the months ahead, such as the Subscription Dining Series this fall and the annual Foundation Gala this December. 



Here are five of Cruz's recommendations for enjoying the rest of the summer while staying healthy.

Stay Hydrated ... with Healthy Foods

Most of us know the importance of hydration and the important role that drinking plenty of water plays in this process, but did you know that the foods we eat can also help us stay hydrated?

Hydrating foods help with summer skin health by keeping skin healthy, soft, and supple. You can keep your skin looking its best by prioritizing electrolyte-rich foods like lemons, pickles, bananas, and more.

Other delicious options that help with hydration include cucumbers, celery, iceberg lettuce, spinach, cantaloupe, strawberries, bell pepper, salmon, tomatoes, and of course, the popular go-to summer treat, watermelon.

Prioritize Vitamin C

he second Commencement Ceremony for stackable industry-recognized credentials in Construction Management held May 6, 2024 celebrated a significant milestone in empowering students and professionals alike. These certificates are designed to enable students to begin applying for jobs before graduation, providing a head start on their careers. Additionally, they offer targeted expertise for applicants seeking to specialize in specific fields within the construction industry. Reflecting the program's growth, 96 students were awarded a total of 254 industry-recognized credentials this year, marking a substantial increase in the number of skilled professionals entering the workforce. It was a wonderful opportunity to bring together students, parents, faculty members, administration, and our external partners, fostering strong working relationships and mutual understanding.

VISIT TO THE NEW JERSEY CITY UNIVERSITY (NJ YOUTH CORPS)

n April 5, Dr. Azhar Mahmood, Coordinator for the Construction Management program, and Larry Anderson from Enrollment Services at HCCC, visited New Jersey City University and gave a presentation to the cohort of NJ Youth Corps about careers in the construction industry.

New Jersey Youth Corps-Jersey City, located at New Jersey City University since 1988, aims to restore young adults' dignity through academic instruction and community service. As one of the largest youth service and conservation corps in the U.S., it offers year-round voluntary programs for young adults aged 16-25. Guided by mentors, youth crews undertake diverse community projects and receive a stipend during their tenure.

It was a successful event the students enjoyed. Of the fifteen students in attendance at the event, nine enrolled in the HCCC Construction Management program after the presentation.



HCCC and IUOE Local 825 Hold Graduation for the Inaugural Class of the Learn & Earn Apprenticeship Program

While high schools and colleges celebrated graduations nationwide, the International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) Local 825 in partnership with HCCC held its first-ever commencement celebration.

This is the first cohort of the innovative, 18-month-long program that began in Spring 2021 and is offered in partnership between HCCC and IUOE Local 825. The program prepares apprentices for careers as Operating Engineers through hands-on apprenticeship experience at Local 825's training center in Dayton, New Jersey. "With rapid technological advancements driving our changing world, we recognize the necessity of having a bettereducated workforce to close that divide," explained Gregory Lalevee, Business Manager of IUOE Local 825.

"Students in this program hit the ground running having completed their degree and apprenticeship obligations while working long hours at difficult jobs across the state," explained Jenn Thomas, Chief Academic Officer at the Training Center. "Their dedication to seeing the program through inspires us, and we are excited about the future of workforce education in New Jersey."

Thanks to the program, 22 students earned Associate of Applied Science degrees in Technical Studies through virtual classes at

HCCC. The inaugural graduating class includes Monique Young, an inspiring journeywoman and skilled trade worker. "Being accepted into IUOE Local 825's first Learn and Earn apprenticeship was an honor and a challenge that allowed me and my fellow brothers and sisters to work together in the workforce, and in courses and programs at HCCC. I know I speak on behalf of my brothers and sisters in saying we could not have done this without the support and motivation we provided each other. I think this workforce is a great building block for strengthening our union. As Greg mentioned, the workforce's technology is rapidly changing, and the courses during the 18 months at HCCC better prepared us for that!"

The International Union of Operating Engineers Local 825's mission is to equip its members with the educational resources for

developing the skills of their apprentices and journeypersons.

"Celebrating the first-ever graduating class of apprentices is a special moment for the graduates and the entire HCCC and IUOE Local 825 family," said Dr. Machli Joseph, Student Success Coach for the program. "It's been so rewarding to see students come into the program with a desire to learn their respective trades, and to watch them grow over these last two years. We believe their HCCC associate degrees will equip them with the practical skills that are in high demand in their job market, and provide a strong educational foundation for them to advance their career prospects."

Empowering Futures: Water Workforce Utility Program's Second Cohort Offers Grant-Funded Training

The HCCC School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development (CEWD), in partnership with New Jersey Future and Jersey Water Works, have collaborated to launch the second cohort of the Water Workforce Utility Program (WWUP). Program partners include Lori Margolin, Associate Vice President of CEWD; Dr. Burl Yearwood, Dean of STEM; Paula Figueroa-Vega, Director of Jersey Water Works; and Matthew Maffei, Apprenticeship Coordinator of New Jersey Water Association. The CEWD program team consists of Anita Belle, Director of Workforce Pathways; Catherina Mirasol, Director of CEWD Operations; Joyce Alvarez, Center for Business and Industry Coordinator; and Mylz Wilson, Student Success Coach.

The second WWUP Cohort began on June 15, 2024 with 19 new students. This cohort follows the successful outcome of the pilot initiative launched in September of 2023. The program is funded by the Pre-Apprenticeship in Career Education (PACE) Grant awarded to Hudson County Community College by the New Jersey Department of Labor and by Bank of America. The intention is to provide students

from all backgrounds with the opportunity to join the program. To complete the program successfully, participants will receive up to \$1,300 to assist with transportation, childcare, or any other needs.

The WWUP is determined to provide students with an introduction to the water industry and to provide career pathways in the water utility sector. Throughout the program, students will receive training and mentorship that will help prepare them for positions in apprenticeships, internships, entry-level jobs, or higher education related to the water industry. The 75-hour program will include a utility-centered activity and a water lab.

Students will also attend OSHA 10, Basic Math Skills, Excel Level 1, Career Readiness, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, Customer Service Skills (Utility Sector), and CPR classes over the course of 10 weeks. The Student Success Coach helps students work towards their goals and prepare for interviews.

Group, helping us achieve our shared objectives even more effectively," wrote HACU President Dr. Antonio Flores in his nomination letter to USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack.

The ten-member USDA-HACU Leadership Group provides guidance and strategic direction to ensure the Hispanic community equitably participates in and benefits from USDA education and employment programs, resources, and services. The group recommends policies and programs to strengthen USDA partnerships with Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) and HACU. The USDA-HACU Leadership Group was created through a Memorandum of Understanding, which was renewed in 2022. The 34-year partnership is the longest HACU has had with a federal agency. Past initiatives generated internships, cooperative agreements, and fellowships.

"I am honored to have been nominated to join this distinguished group of leaders and to engage in their important work of helping ensure there is equal accessibility to all USDA opportunities for the men and women of one of the fastest growing segments of our population," Dr. Reber stated. "I am proud to lead and support our long-standing Hispanic-Serving Institution and honored to be a member and partner of HACU."

Agriculture is the Garden State's third largest industry, earning \$1.5 billion in annual revenue. New Jersey produces more than 100 crops, according to the USDA Farm Service Agency-NJ State Office. HCCC offers a host of programs for students that address natural resources/agricultural challenges. These include building a hydroponic mushroom farm that supplies the HCCC Culinary Arts program; conducting soil assessment projects; offering degree programs in Environmental Studies; and much more.
