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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOLDS DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. ANNUAL MEMORIAL

While advocating economic and racial equity, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. declared, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." Jailed 29 times for acts of nonviolent protest, Dr. King dedicated his life to advancing civil rights and social justice. The late U.S. Representative John Lewis described such activism as "good trouble," acknowledging that the pursuit of justice may continue across lifetimes and generations. More than a half century after his assassination, Dr. King's vision continues to inspire dialogue, understanding, and action rooted in shared human experience.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) hosted its Fourth Annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial on Thursday, January 29, 2026, at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center in Jersey City. The event brought together students, faculty, staff, and community members to honor Dr. King's enduring legacy and reflect on the ongoing pursuit of equity and civil liberties. HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber delivered welcoming remarks, emphasizing

the importance of engaging in meaningful dialogue and collective responsibility.

Kevin D. Richardson, a member of the Exonerated Five and a nationally recognized criminal justice reform advocate, delivered the keynote address. Mr. Richardson became a symbol of wrongful conviction following the 1989 Central Park jogger assault and rape case. He and four other Black and Hispanic teenagers were imprisoned based on coerced confessions obtained after more than 24 hours without access to food, water, bathrooms, or legal counsel. In 2002, Matias Reyes confessed to the crime, and DNA evidence confirmed his guilt, leading to the exoneration of the five men.

Since his exoneration, Mr. Richardson has devoted his life to advocacy and education. He partnered with the Innocence Project to raise awareness about wrongful convictions and launched C.P.R. (Courage, Perseverance, and Resilience), a workshop designed to help young people understand their civil rights and navigate police encounters. Through the Kevin

On Saturday, Jan. 24, 2026, representatives from Hudson County Community College (HCCC) attended the Jersey City NAACP Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Breakfast. Held at the Marriott Newark Liberty International Airport, the event centered on the theme "A Legacy That Lives On: Honoring Years of Courage, Commitment, and Community."

The morning was filled with powerful insights, featuring a keynote address by Reverend Dr. Ralph M. Branch, Jr., and a profound tribute to the late Captain Thomas Gerald Taylor, the trailblazing first African American Jersey City firefighter who founded this annual tradition. The breakfast provided a meaningful opportunity for HCCC staff to network with community leaders and local students, gaining valuable perspectives from their diverse life experiences.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE EXPANDS GATEWAY TO INNOVATION PROGRAM WITH BANK OF AMERICA CHARITABLE FOUNDATION GRANT

Bank of America Charitable Foundation awarded the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation a \$150,000 grant to expand the nationally acclaimed HCCC Gateway to Innovation (GTI) Program. The funding will support paid, work-based learning opportunities for students.

"We are profoundly grateful to Bank of America Charitable Foundation for this investment in our Gateway to Innovation program," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "The funding will help us develop and pilot the GTI Experiential Learning Opportunities Program as a scalable model. We will employ collaborations with business leaders, labor unions, workforce development partners, public agencies, and community organizations to create high-impact learning opportunities for our students and the people of Hudson County."

The College will develop the Experiential Learning Opportunities Program featuring non-credit, work-based learning including job shadowing, mentoring, internships, and structured feedback to enhance career progression and economic mobility. The grant will support a credential-based internship model serving 50 students and fund a full-time

Internship Coordinator. Participants will receive wraparound supports, including transportation, childcare, digital access, and services through the HCCC Hudson Helps Resource Center, which offers food pantries, career support, mental health services, and community referrals.

HCCC's School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development launched GTI in 2021 to address post-pandemic economic challenges by connecting individuals to recession-resistant career pathways. The program provides equitable access to family-sustaining wages and helped thousands of students and community members earn industry-recognized credentials in finance, health care, information technology, and logistics. GTI has received national recognition as a Bellwether College Consortium Workforce Development Award finalist and earned the League for Innovation in the Community College's 2022-2023 Innovation of the Year Award.

Hudson County Executive Craig Guy Breaks Ground on Mercer Park Pavilion, Prepares for 2026 Open Space Trust Fund Awards

As temperatures remain frigid throughout New Jersey, Hudson County Executive Craig Guy is preparing for the spring and summer by working to improve our county and municipal parks. 2025 was a big year for green space in Hudson County. In May, County Executive Guy celebrated the 20-year anniversary of the Open Space Trust Fund, announcing \$11.7 million in awards throughout all 12 Hudson County municipalities. Municipalities use these funds to upgrade their parks and green spaces. Like in Hoboken, where County Executive Guy and municipal officials broke ground on Maritime Park, an 8.7-acre waterfront park located at the former Union Dry Dock site. Maritime Park will include a modern skatepark, a flexible lawn, a new learning pier for marine education, a living shoreline of marshes and tide pools, a playground with natural-materials, a public plaza inspired by the Castle Point bluffs, a community building with meeting space and a rooftop observation deck, expanded beaches, and an extension of the Hudson River Waterfront

Walkway. We are seeing upgrades like these throughout Hudson County and we are excited to announce our 2026 Open Space Trust Fund award recommendations later this year.

County Executive Guy is also hard at work upgrading our county parks. On January 12 County Executive Guy, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners Anthony L. Romano, and Commissioner Jerry Walker (D-3) celebrated the groundbreaking of a brand-new pavilion at Mercer Park in Bayonne. The groundbreaking was also attended by Jersey City Councilwoman Denise Ridley (Ward A) and Hudson County Register Jeffrey Dublin. This exciting project will create an outdoor community space complete with room for concession stands and new bathrooms, enhancing the park's ability to host events and providing residents with a welcoming space to gather.

"This pavilion is more than a structure; it's a gathering place where families and neighbors

can come together, celebrate, and create lasting memories. It reflects the shared commitment of my administration and the Board of County Commissioners to invest in our communities while expanding opportunities for minority-owned businesses," said Craig Guy, Hudson County Executive. "I am especially proud that this project will be built by MDW Construction Service, a minority-owned contractor rooted right here in our community. This effort represents a meaningful investment in the neighborhood and a defining accomplishment for Commissioner Jerry Walker. I thank Commissioner Walker for his tireless advocacy and dedication to delivering a space that truly reflects and serves the residents of his district."



While it may seem like summer is a long way away, Hudson County Executive Craig Guy is working to ensure our parks and green spaces are top notch and safe for all residents.

ARTIST NEWS


Artist **Faith Ringgold** took on tough subjects. Both of her works in the Foundation Art Collection deal with the period of American enslavement and the Underground Railroad (the name for the secret paths that enslaved people took to freedom). You can see her work on the third and sixth floors of the Gabert Library. In a recent review in *The New York Times* of a show of her works at Jack Shainman Gallery in New York City, writer Will Heinrich notes, "It can seem hard these days to reconcile joy and outrage, hard to understand how a single history could contain so much pain alongside so much beauty, let alone one person's artistic expression. But Ringgold demonstrated

that an artist could make work about anything that struck her as worth thinking about, from the terrors of slavery to a simple bouquet. Her sensibility, her humanity, was strong enough to unify them all."

Artist **Yoko Ono** broke new ground in the 1960s when she insisted her work was meant to be touched. Here is the Museum of Modern Art recently discussing this breakthrough:

How Yoko Ono Challenged a Museum Taboo - (<https://tinyurl.com/2sd4jkna>) Ono's Studio Director, Connor Monahan, says that touch creates connection and communication, which is "what people need to create peace." The Foundation Art Collection work is too fragile to be touched. As the video points out, if you touch art, oils on your fingers will create an impression that over time will be etched into the surface. Even though touching art is fun, this is why we put art in plexiglass boxes at HCCC—so more people, over time will be able to enjoy it.

Nicole Vecchione, Director of Research, and Percy Lujan, Organizer, from the Laborers' International Union of North America (LIUNA) visited the Hudson County Community College Construction Management Honors Club to educate students about labor rights in the construction industry.

The speakers discussed LIUNA's ongoing efforts to address unsafe working conditions and unfair labor practices at local construction sites in Jersey City. Their advocacy has

contributed to Department of Labor stop-work orders issued at several locations across the city.

During the session, Ms. Vecchione and Mr. Lujan highlighted critical issues affecting construction workers, including wage theft, worker misclassification, labor law violations, and safety concerns. They also outlined the rights and protections available to workers and emphasized the importance of ethical labor practices within the construction profession.



FIFTH ANNUAL STEMTASTIC SCIENCE FAIR INSPIRES YOUNG SCIENTISTS AT HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) proudly hosted the Fifth Annual STEMtastic Science Fair on Thursday, Jan. 15 in the College's STEM Building, welcoming students from Dr. Michael Conti Public School #5 for a dynamic day of hands-on science learning.

The STEMtastic Science Fair aimed to spark curiosity and enthusiasm for STEM fields through interactive, experiential learning. Throughout the day, students actively participated in six engaging activity stations that introduced core scientific concepts in accessible and exciting ways.

"The STEMtastic Science Fair reflects our commitment to early STEM education and meaningful community partnerships," said Dr. Burl Yearwood, Dean of STEM at Hudson County Community College. "By opening our STEM facilities to young learners, we hope to inspire curiosity, confidence, and a lifelong interest in science and innovation."

Dr. Christopher Reber, President of Hudson County Community College, emphasized the broader impact of the event.

Students rotated through six hands-on stations that explored Newton's Third Law of Motion through physical demonstrations; introduced encryption and decryption concepts related to coding and cybersecurity; showcased laser engraving technology used in modern manufacturing; examined the pH of household chemicals; demonstrated light refraction in water; and provided a safe, simulated introduction to blood typing and medical science. Educators and volunteers guided students at each station, encouraging collaboration, inquiry, and critical thinking.

"This experience allowed our students to see science come alive beyond the classroom," John Rivero, Principal of Dr. Michael Conti Public School #5 said "The hands-on activities helped students build confidence, ask questions, and begin to see themselves as future scientists and engineers."

Now in its fifth year, the STEMtastic Science Fair continues to strengthen the partnership between Hudson County Community College and Dr. Michael Conti Public School #5 while empowering students through immersive, hands-on STEM learning opportunities.

Celebrating Student Success at the HCCC Winter Graduation

The HCCC Winter Graduation on Dec. 16, 2025 celebrated five students from the New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) Hot Food Proficiency Program for successfully completing their academic requirements.

We extend our sincere gratitude to HCCC's leadership, faculty, and staff whose vision and commitment made this initiative possible. Their continued investment in innovative, inclusive programs is transforming lives and strengthening our community—one graduate at a time.

Hudson County Community College, NJRC Welding Program, and GreenpointXR Launch Immersive Welding Training Pilot Partnership

The Hudson County Community College Welding Program, in partnership with the New Jersey Reentry Corporation, has announced a pilot collaboration with solution provider GreenpointXR to enhance the existing welding program with an immersive, technology-driven welding training module. This addition strengthens the program's ability to prepare students for high-demand careers while improving institutional efficiency and workforce alignment.

This innovative partnership integrates extended reality (XR) headsets, advanced welding simulators, learning management system (LMS) integration, and real-time analytics into a unified training environment. Through this agreement, HCCC students are prioritized for access, ensuring they are first in line to benefit from these advanced training opportunities.

According to the American Welding Society, 84 percent of employers report difficulty finding qualified welders. The collaboration with GreenpointXR allows HCCC students to benefit from enhanced welding instruction that accelerates skill acquisition, enhances safety, and supports certification readiness.

By reducing reliance on consumable materials such as gas and metal, GreenpointXR reports that virtual welding training can lower instructional costs by up to 56 percent while also decreasing safety incidents by more than 30 percent, based on national Virtual Reality welding studies. The scalable nature of XR technology enables HCCC to train more students in a flexible learning environment.

Implementation will begin with a strategic pilot phase in the spring, followed by evaluation and potential full integration into HCCC welding courses.

Nickey Boyd, A.S., Culinary Arts, HCCC Class of 2015

Owner and pastry chef at Sweets by Nickoy in Jacksonville, FL. She has previously worked as a pastry chef (and executive pastry chef) at various restaurants and hospitality groups.

What brought you to HCCC?

What made it the right choice for you?

I realized HCCC was the right choice for me because it was local, the class sizes were small and there was a lot of diversity – people with different educational levels and from all walks of life alongside you in each class.

How did you become interested in culinary arts?

I watched my mom and dad cook a lot growing up. It took me a while to realize it was also a passion of mine but after doing a lot of cooking and baking at home, I started to consider a career in the culinary industry.

What got you interested in pastries, and pastry arts as a career path?

I actually prefer cooking savory dishes, but it was initially a business decision as I assumed pastries would be the best way to start a business. I figured that it was probably easier to sell cupcakes than savory dishes, but now, based on my experience in the industry, I realize that either direction would have paid off for me. Ultimately, I do love creating beautiful desserts for people.

How did your time at HCCC help prepare you for your career? What was your first job after culinary school?

My time at HCCC prepared me for my career because we got to see what the real world was like through the eyes of our instructors. It was refreshing being taught by individuals who attended the culinary program at HCCC and worked in the fields we were heading into, so they were able to give us stories and advice from both their personal and professional experience.

My first job after graduating was at Chocopain in Jersey City. Working there increased my love and appreciation for French pastries. I learned



so much working there and still use some of the techniques today.

Tell us about Sweets by Nickoy!

Sweets by Nickoy is the business I started after culinary school. It's a space where I get to create classic yet high-end desserts for parties and weddings. It is also a way that I give back by offering my services and products at low to no cost for people who would like the experience but probably can't afford it.

What inspired you to give back like that?

I initially started offering my services for free when I didn't have clients and would bake for my church, but when I saw how happy it made people, I realized I wanted to bring that happiness to anyone in need. I've baked for churches, friends, the community, and even for hospitals during COVID.

I'm sure it made an impact by showing others that there are still kind-hearted people that can do something they love without there being a cost involved and purely for the enjoyment of others.

What advice do you have for students who want to follow in your footsteps?

One piece of advice I would offer is to never give up on your goals and dreams. There's room and space in this world and in this industry for all of us to win. Also, when you feel like you've made it to the top, reach your hand down and help those who started where you were.

Any favorite memories of HCCC you'd like to share?

I met lots of memorable people during my time at HCCC, including Chef Lontoc, Chef Puk, Dr. K., and Ms. Webb. I made tons of friends along the way as well.


Richardson Foundation, he continues to promote social responsibility, criminal justice reform, and transformative futures.
