JACK KENT COOKE RECIPIENT MARLON PEÑA CRESPO NAMED HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE CLASS OF 2026 VALEDICTORIAN

Marlon Peña Crespo was named the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Class of 2026 Valedictorian. He addressed graduates, family members, faculty, staff, and guests at the College’s 49th Annual Commencement Ceremony on May 19, 2026, at Sports Illustrated Stadium in Harrison, NJ.

Marlon graduated with an Associate in Science degree in Computer Science and a perfect 4.0 grade point average. A member of the Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, he was also awarded the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship, one of the nation’s most competitive scholarships for community college students. This fall, he will continue his education at Columbia University.

After arriving in the United States from Cuba, Marlon adapted to a new educational system and transformed that experience into a commitment to using technology for social impact. His work focuses on leveraging Artificial Intelligence (AI) to improve access to resources for underserved communities through human-centered, scalable solutions.

Earlier this year, Marlon completed the inaugural AI for Impact New Jersey Community College Fellowship as a Product Management Intern. Selected from a pool of 89 applicants, he developed a bilingual spatial data tool to map local

resources and created a chatbot providing real-time guidance for immigrant communities navigating social systems. The program was created through a partnership among the New Jersey Office of Innovation, the New Jersey Council of County Colleges, and the New Jersey Economic Development Authority, with InnovateUS facilitating the fellowship experience.

The HCCC Class of 2026 included more than 1,700 graduates, making it the largest graduating class in the College’s history.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) received the 2026 "Top Colleges for Innovation" Award from *Insight Into Academia* Magazine, the nation's longest-running publication dedicated to advancing best practices in higher education.

"We thank *Insight Into Academia* for this honor, and we celebrate our faculty and staff who work tirelessly to support student success," said Dr. Christopher Reber, President of Hudson County Community College. "This award reflects our College-wide commitment to innovation. Hudson is Home!"

The "Top Colleges for Innovation" Award recognizes institutions where creativity and measurable impact are embedded into efforts to meet the evolving needs of students, employees, and businesses. HCCC was recognized for integrating innovation into its mission, strategic plan, partnerships, programs, curricula, and career pathways.

Among the initiatives highlighted were:

- **Hudson Scholars**, the Bellwether Award-

winning student success model that has significantly increased completion rates and reduced equity gaps for underrepresented students.

- **Gateway to Innovation (GTI)**, which connects service industry workers to recession-resistant careers through workforce training and industry-recognized credentials.
- **The Holz Technik Apprenticeship Program** with Eastern Millwork, Inc., which provides debt-free pathways to degrees and engineering careers in advanced manufacturing.
- **Partnerships with the New Jersey Reen-**

try Corporation that provide workforce credentials for formerly incarcerated individuals.

- **Innovative employee onboarding, STEM research opportunities, and the College's Artificial Intelligence Strategy and Governance Council**, which guides responsible AI adoption across teaching, learning, and operations.

NEWS FROM HUDSON COUNTY EXECUTIVE CRAIG GUY

Hudson County Executive Craig Guy Thanks HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber for Years of Service, Commits to Ensuring HCCC Remains a Statewide Leader in Educational Opportunities

In April, Dr. Christopher M. Reber announced that he accepted the position of President of Harrisburg University of Science and Technology in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. County Executive Craig Guy thanks Dr. Reber for his eight years of service at Hudson County Community College. Working in partnership with Hudson County, Dr. Reber, and the school's Board of Trustees, HCCC has become a pillar of the county's higher education community. Students leave HCCC well prepared for continuing their education or entering the workforce.

While the search for a new president continues, Hudson County remains committed to ensuring HCCC remains a first-rate educational institution. In 2024, County Executive Guy worked with Dr.

Reber and Congressman Rob Menendez to secure a \$1.75 million Strengthening Community Colleges Training Grant. Grant funding expanded HCCC's Gateway to Innovation program's capacity to provide training that addresses the skill needs of employers in the Hudson County Financial Services and Technology sectors. HCCC was the only New Jersey recipient of the funding in Round Four of this grant. Additionally, Hudson County provided funding for the Center for Student Success, a new facility which will include 24 classrooms, expanded student services areas and common spaces, a full regulation-size NCAA gym, fitness center, black-box theater, and health sciences laboratories. Finally, in partnership with the Hudson County Improvement Authority and Hudson County Economic Development Corporation,



HCCC conducts an internship program to connect local businesses with students. In 2025 alone, 28 interns were placed with over 30 corporate partners.

County Executive Guy is proud to stand alongside Hudson County Community College, its Board of Trustees, faculty, staff, and administration as partners in ensuring that this important institution continues to open doors and create opportunities for our students. And we will continue working together with HCCC to make higher education accessible, affordable, and attainable for all those who wish to pursue it.

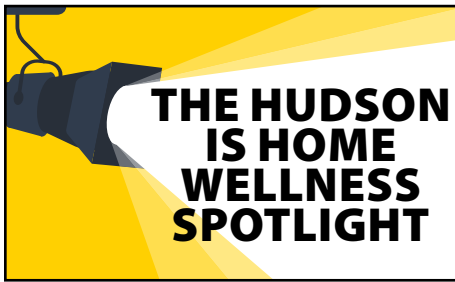

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND RUTGERS UNIVERSITY-NEWARK SIGN CONNECT TRANSFER PATHWAYS AGREEMENT



On Monday, May 4, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) and Rutgers University–Newark officially launched the CONNECT Transfer Program—expanding seamless pathways from associate to bachelor's degrees with enhanced transfer, advising, and support.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND STOCKTON UNIVERSITY EXPAND ARTICULATION AGREEMENT TO INCLUDE PATHWAY TO HEMP AND CANNABIS BUSINESS MANAGEMENT BACHELOR'S DEGREE

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) and Stockton University have signed a new memorandum of understanding (MOU) that expands upon a 2022 articulation agreement and creates a seamless transfer pathway for students pursuing careers in the rapidly growing cannabis industry.

Signed on April 28, 2026 by HCCC Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Darryl Jones and Stockton University Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Michael A. Palladino, the agreement enables students earning an HCCC Associate of Science (A.S.) in Business Administration with the Cannabis Studies Option to transfer directly into Stockton's Bachelor of Science (B.S.) in Hemp and Cannabis Management program.

"This program-to-program agreement saves students time and tuition costs by eliminating duplication of courses, allowing them to earn their degrees in a more seamless and timely manner," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. The agreement also includes conditional dual admission, joint advising, and special programs for participating students.

Stockton University was the first institution in New Jersey to offer an undergraduate degree in Cannabis Studies. The

partnership will help prepare students for careers in one of the nation's fastest-growing industries through specialized business education and practical workforce training.

In the article Semmel talks about how she responds to the accolades she's now receiving: "I'm told how I've been an inspiration to them, and of course, it's very flattering to hear," she said. "I never started out to be an inspiration. I started out to just do what I've tried to do. It's just

because I got to be 93 years old, and I'm still talking."

Last year, donor Charles Kessler gave us a 1974 mixed-media work by **George Herms**. Recently, in an obituary about the artist who died this April, the writer Matt Stromberg said, "He transformed found materials and cast-off debris into poetic representations of impermanence, suffused with pathos and humor." A collection of this scale requires ongoing conservation, archival storage and framing, expert art handling, and professional stewardship to ensure the works remain accessible and preserved for future generations. **HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE PRESENTS ‘KEEP HOPE ALIVE:
 A GOSPEL CELEBRATION HONORING THE LEGACY OF REVEREND JESSE JACKSON’**

Reverend Jesse Jackson, ordained as a Baptist minister in 1968, extended his ministry far beyond the pulpit. Known as “a preacher without boundaries,” he advocated for people who were poor, marginalized, and underserved. Throughout his life, Reverend Jackson fought against segregation and voting restrictions while championing affordable housing, fair wages, and universal health-care. His iconic “Keep Hope Alive” speech at the 1988 Democratic National Convention inspired millions, and his legacy continued to influence generations following his passing.

In recognition of Reverend Jackson’s impact on civil rights and faith communities, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) presented “Keep Hope Alive: A Gospel Celebration Honoring the Legacy of Reverend Jesse Jackson” on Thursday, April 30, 2026, at the HCCC Culinary Con-

ference Center in Jersey City. The event celebrated the enduring connection between gospel music, faith, and social justice.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber welcomed guests, and Reverend Dr. Dorothy Patterson of Wallace Temple A.M.E. Zion Church in Bayonne served as Mistress of Ceremonies. The program featured introductory remarks by Dr. Yeurys Pujols, HCCC Vice President for Institutional Engagement and Excellence; an invocation delivered by Reverend Dr. Bertha Reels; a tribute reading by HCCC student Morgan Thompson; and musical performances by Rhudy Snelling, Jr., Helen White, Trinity Lutheran Church Choir Jersey City, and The Anointed Voices of Mt. Pisgah. Closing remarks were delivered by HCCC Trustee Emerita Pamela Gardner.

Rooted in ancestral African musical traditions, gospel music historically featured a cappella singing, call-and-response



participation, rhythmic hand-clapping, and foot-stomping. Emerging from traditional Christian hymns and spirituals, gospel music became a powerful symbol of hope, faith, and resistance. In his book, *The Black Church: This Is Our Story, This Is Our Song*, Dr. Henry Louis Gates, Jr. wrote that gospel music inspired courage and unity among enslaved people and later served as a source of strength during the Civil Rights Movement. Gospel music also influenced the development of blues, jazz, swing, rhythm and blues, and soul music.

“Keep Hope Alive: A Gospel Celebration Honoring the Legacy of Reverend Jesse Jackson” was presented by the HCCC African American Outreach Committee.

Rooted in storytelling and immersive visual displays, "Send Silence Packing®" shared the personal experiences of youth and young adults navigating mental health challenges and the silence that often surrounds suicide. Through mixed-media exhibits and personal narratives, the pro-

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE VALEDICTORIAN AWARDED PRESTIGIOUS JACK KENT COOKE FOUNDATION UNDERGRADUATE TRANSFER SCHOLARSHIP

Hudson County Community College Class of 2026 Valedictorian Marlon Peña Crespo has been named a recipient of the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. Selected from a pool of 1,300 applicants nationwide, Marlon is one of only 60 community college students to earn the highly competitive award, which provides up to \$55,000 annually for as many as three years to help students complete their bachelor's degrees with minimal debt. Marlon plans to attend Columbia University.

"We are so proud of Marlon and everything he has accomplished," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "He is a brilliant example of how a commitment to academic success can transform one's life and help improve the lives of others."

A resident of West New York and member of Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, Marlon is graduating with an Associate in Science degree in Computer Science and a perfect 4.0 GPA. Originally from Cuba, he overcame the challenges of adapting to a new academic system while pursuing his passion for technology and Artificial Intelligence to address real-world

ALUMNI CORNER

Anthony J. Geremonte, Esq. A.S., Summa Cum Laude, Criminal Justice HCCC Class of 2016



Anthony is a Junior Partner at the law firm Kiczek & Kaphish, LLC.

What brought you to HCCC? HCCC came to my high school and held an informational seminar. I liked their pitch and felt that the College aligned with my goals and interests. No one in my family held a degree higher than high school. So, community college seemed like the best starting point for me.

What made HCCC the right choice for you?

Once I saw the programs they offered and their willingness to help students at every point in their journey, I was sold. The professors have been and continue to be my biggest supporters. They told everyone, not only me, that we could accomplish anything we put our minds to.

What were your next steps after HCCC?

After graduating HCCC, I was accepted into NJCU. I graduated from NJCU with my bachelor's degree and sought out employment. I knew I had an interest in law from my various classes at HCCC and NJCU. So, I got a job as a legal assistant at a Hudson County law firm. It was from there I applied to and was accepted into New York Law School. I graduated with my JD, took the bar exam, passed, and was sworn in as the first attorney in my family.

What made you interested in pursuing a career as a lawyer?

Professor Cathie Seidman had a huge impact on my interest in the legal field. She herself was an attorney for many years. She would tell me stories about her time both as an attorney and as a law student. It was those conversations that drove me to find a job in the legal field after graduating NJCU.

What kind of law is your focus?

My legal practice primarily focuses on real estate transactions, both residential and commercial, estate planning, estate administration, estate litigation, and landlord-tenant disputes.

What interested you in this area of law?

I always enjoyed transactional legal work because of how widely different it is from litigation. In litigation, everyone is against each other. In transactional law, everyone is working together. Attorneys are proposing innovative solutions rather than filing motions and documents against each other. Transactional law is also very client heavy. Meaning, there are more meetings, phone calls, and overall more interaction with your client. You get to build a close relationship with clients in transactional that you sometimes miss in litigation.

What advice would you give to HCCC students who are interested in a career in the legal field?

My advice would be to use all of HCCC's resources at your disposal and try to get as much exposure to the legal field as possible. The world of an attorney is not as it appears to be on television and film. When you work in an actual legal setting, you get to see the work for what it truly is.

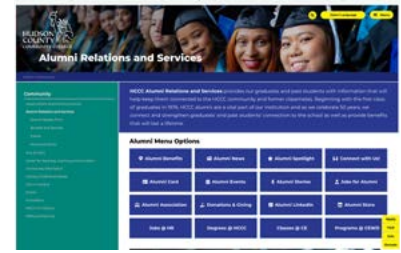
What does your day look like as a lawyer in this field (since you mentioned it is not as it seems on TV)?

My day varies depending on many factors. However, an average day looks like this: I get in the office at 8:30 a.m. and respond to emails that came in after hours and catch up on some work I could not complete the day before; I'll have a few meetings with clients between 9:00 and 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 and 4:30 p.m. During that time I also often have a real estate closing, conduct an estate planning intake, perform a will signing ceremony, file documents for estate administration, file documents for estate litigation, file documents for an eviction, and delegate work to my staff.

What are some of your hobbies or interests outside of law?

I am a huge history buff. I collect memorabilia from WWII. I am also a comic book collector and attend New York Comic Con every year.
