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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND RUTGERS UNIVERSITY - NEWARK SIGN DUAL ADMISSION PROGRAM AGREEMENT

ates will have yet another option available to them for attaining a bachelor's degree, as the College has entered into a dual-admissions program with Rutgers University - Newark (RU-N).

HCCC and RU-N signed the letter of intent for the program on Wednesday, April 8, 2015. Hudson County Community College President Glen Gabert, Ph.D. was joined by Rutgers University - Newark Chancellor Nancy Cantor, Ph.D.

The agreement will facilitate the seamless transfer of HCCC students who graduate with an associate degree to RU-N with full junior status. The agreement will also provide for a "reverse transfer" agreement, whereas RU-N students who wish to, may transfer to HCCC to attain their associate degree, even after they have graduated from RU-N.

Other provisions of the agreement call for providing prospective academic advisement and financial aid counseling for students considering transfer from HCCC to RU-N, continued support for HCCC students after transferring to RU-N, and exploring the possibility of joint fundraising for scholarship support of students transferring to RU-N.

Dr. Gabert noted that the letter of intent builds upon an established relationship with Rutgers University - Newark that has included other collaborative and articulation agreements.

"Over the years, we have worked together with Rutgers University - Newark to provide HCCC students with ways of attaining a baccalaureate degree that will lead to a more secure future," Dr. Gabert stated. "This dual admission agreement will make it easier for our students to attain their bachelor's degrees in Art, Biology, Business, Computer Arts,



As of Jan. 1, 2015, the standard mileage rates for the use of your personal vehicle for business travel is 57.5 cents per mile for business miles driven

The new rate is slightly higher than the rate for 2014.

Please use this rate when completing travel expense reports when using your personal vehicle for College-related travel.

Note: This does not apply to travel commute from home to work.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE TO HOST PANEL DISCUSSIONS ON WORKS CREATED BY CONTEMPORARY NEW JERSEY ARTISTS

udson County Community College (HCCC) invites the members of the community to attend two free panel discussions – one on contemporary art and the other on mid-20th century art. Both are part of "The Changing Scene of Contemporary Art in New Jersey," a mini-series sponsored by the College's Cultural Affairs Task Force, and made possible by a grant from the New Jersey Council for the Humanities, a State partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The discussions – which will be held in the HCCC Culinary Conference Center – will provide a context for works included in the HCCC Foundation Art Collection. The Culinary Conference Center is located at 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City – just two blocks from the Journal Square PATH Station. Seating is limited and reservations may be made by contacting Clifford Brooks at (201) 978-5720 or cbrooks@hccc.edu.

The first panel discussion, "Facing the Dilemmas of the World: New Jersey Contemporary Artists," is scheduled for Thursday, May 7, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. The discussion will feature artists Eric Avery, M.D., Valeri Larko and Barbara Madsen, and will explore themes such as gender- and race-equality, and religious, social, and political issues, which transcend time, culture, and civilization.

The other discussion, "The Fluxus Movement: ½ Century Late," will take place on Friday, May 8, 2015 at 11 a.m., and will feature Professors Gerry Beegan and Donna Gustafson. It will focus on the cross-disciplinary nature of the Fluxus Movement (also referred to as the New Brunswick School of Art), its role in the humanities and its influence. (The HCCC Foundation Art Collection includes ten works by Fluxus artists, including Marcel Duchamp, Yoko Ono, and Carolee Schneemann.)

The HCCC Cultural Affairs Task Force was established by the College's Board of Trustees and administration to provide the College with guidance and assistance in determining goals centered around several issues, including guidelines and suggestions for cultural programming and events that should be supported by the College.

About the panelists:

Dr. Eric Avery worked as a consulting psychiatrist, specializing in the treatment of HIV and AIDS. Throughout his life, he made relief prints with themes that frequently relate to sexuality, the human body, and issues surrounding the treatment of HIV and AIDS. His works may be found in the Smith College Art Museum, Baltimore Art Museum, Fogg Art Museum at Harvard University, Firestone Library at Princeton University, The Library of Congress, to name but a few venues.

Valeri Larko, a native of New Jersey, is renowned for her densely painted landscapes of decaying and abandoned structures in America's urban centers and their stories. Ms. Larko's paintings have been exhibited in The Morris Museum (Morristown, NJ), the Hunterdon Art Museum (Clinton, NJ), The New Jersey State Museum, Safe-T-Gallery (Brooklyn, NY), Bronx River Art Center (NY), and Visual Arts Center of New Jersey (Summit, NJ). In 2000, Ms. Larko was commissioned to paint a major mural for the Secaucus Transfer Station, the largest train station in New Jersey.

Barbara Madsen is best known for her works in installation, sculpture, photography, and video. Her vast collections of cast-off 20th century industrial matter inspire her work, which depicts a world gone awry. An associate professor of art at the Mason Gross School of the Arts at Rutgers University, Ms. Madsen's videos have been broadcast in Germany, France and Italy, and her works have been exhibited in Europe, Asia, the Middle East and the United States.

Professor Gerry Beegan is a writer, curator, and designer whose research explores the relationships between art, design, media, and audience. In 2008, he published a book, The Mass Image, and his criticism and research have appeared in many magazines and journals.

Donna Gustafson, Ph.D., is currently the Andrew W. Mellon Liaison for Academic Programs and Curator at the Zimmerli Art Museum at Rutgers University. She is also an instructor for the Rutgers Early College Humanities program, and has held several museum positions, including Curator and Chief Curator at the American Federation of Arts. Dr. Gustafson has published widely on American and contemporary art, and presented papers and lectures at the Whitney Museum of American Art and Cooper-Hewitt Museum of Design. She was also co-chair of a College Art Association Fluxus panel.

LIFE AND WORK OF THE NUNS OF THE BLUE CHAPEL HIGHLIGHTED IN HUDSON ROOTS FEATURE

lifford J. Brooks, Assistant to the President for Cultural Affairs at Hudson County Community College, is the author of "Nuns of the Blue Chapel," an article which was published in *Hudson Roots*, a newsletter of the Hudson County Genealogical & Historical Society, and an excerpt of which appears below. The Hudson County Community College Foundation (HCCC) Art Collection contains over 800 items on display in the College's buildings. Among the most significant components on the collection is a permanent exhibit of work in different media by four nuns titled "Artwork of the Nuns at the Blue Chapel in Union City, 1930s-1990s," which can be visited at the HCCC North Hudson Higher Education Center (NHHEC) during open hours on the seventh floor of the Union City facility located at 4800 Kennedy Blvd.

Included among the items permanently on display are paintings, drawings, and cards by Sister Mary of the Compassion, O.P., considered by many to be one of the greatest Dominican artists of the 20th century. All works were formerly in private collections.

Woodblock prints and cards by Sister Mary Gemma of Jesus Crucified, O.P. attest to the Blue Chapel's consistent policy of using the innate talents of community members to assist in the monastery's financial support. Sister died on Aug. 28, 2012, soon after seeing her framed work that is displayed in this exhibit. Other works on view include oils by Sister Mary Hyacinthe, O.P. and Sister Mary Imelda, O.P.

Since the departure of the remaining Nuns in 2009, efforts at preservation and obtaining landmark status have caused researchers to unearth facts about the land, building, and décor that even the Sisters still alive did not know. This exhibit, however, is not about the physical edifice, but about the world that existed within. It looks at four Nuns, all artists in their own right, who

were members of a thriving community of female religious that included over the years four organists, two carpenters, a number of seamstresses, nurses, cooks, shoe makers, accountants, writers, and even sisters with boiler licenses. In short, the Blue Chapel was its own autonomous community, a microcosm of the world around it, self-sufficient and completely run by a large group of dedicated women who entered the enclosure not to escape from the world, but to make it better through their prayer and good works.

It is important, however, for the viewers of this exhibit to know just a bit about the women whom they will meet through their artwork. Each made a choice to become a Roman Catholic cloistered nun, who unlike an "active" sister who teaches or nurses the sick, chooses to remain inside a cloister or enclosure for the rest of her life. Most cloistered nuns take solemn vows and live in monasteries, not convents. Prior to the Second Vatican Council (in the 1960s), once they entered and decided to remain within, they would not go out even to their family's funerals. Their days were organized for prayer, work, and short recreational periods. Inside of the monastery, one could find two well-stocked libraries, an infirmary for the sick and dying, a dental office complete with a standard dental chair and drill, industrial quality washers and dryers, and workrooms of every kind. The Sisters had to earn their own money through their handiwork or donations. Some older Union City residents still remember the "extern" sisters (sisters who did the shopping and external work for the others who remained inside) taking out a horse and cart to collect food and materials from local merchants.

Note: The Monastery of the Dominican Sisters of Perpetual Rosary, known as the Blue Chapel, is located at 605 14th Street in Union City. Erected between 1912 and 1915, the 1.3 acre Gothic complex is surrounded by 12-foot high bluestone walls. Founded by Father Damien Marie Saintourens, a French Dominican priest, the Monastery was the cloistered home to a group of Sisters of the Perpetual Rosary from its founding until it closed in 2009.

NEWLY TENURED FACULTY

Claudia Delgado is an instructor in Academic Foundations Math. In addition to her commendable teaching, Claudia has made significant contributions to student learning outside of the classroom. She accompanied a student to the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities Quiz Bowl. In line with the New Jersey Council of County Colleges' Big Idea and the HCCC Academic Affairs strategic goal of transforming developmental education, she has been instrumental in establishing innovation in Academic Foundations Math. Claudia has also remained active in College governance, Academic Affairs Committee, Periodic Review Report, and Developmental Math Advisory Board. Claudia personifies a belief that she articulated in her letter to the Tenure Committee: students are quick to discern a caring teacher from one who is simply knowledgeable.



• Christopher Drew is an instructor of Criminal Justice. Currently, he is developing curriculum for a Homeland Security degree. This development includes work that would partner HCCC with Middlesex County College and New Jersey City University in a Title V cooperative grant application. Chris is currently working toward his doctorate at NJCU.



• Dr. Velino Joasil is an instructor in Biology. Students and colleagues often note his energy and infectious enthusiasm. Velino has served on the Curriculum and Instruction Committee and as the Chair of Academic Affairs Committee. Emblematic of his commitment to student learning outside of the classroom, Velino also serves as the faculty advisor to the Biology Club.

HCCC ADMINISTRATORS UNDERGO VAWA TRAINING

In 2013, President Obama signed into federal law the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA), which is aimed at improving how colleges and universities in the United States address sexual violence. This new law imposes obligations for colleges and universities to revise their policies and practices to comply with new regulations that address and prohibit acts of violence, such as sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking, and it clarifies the rights of victims.

On April 8 and 9, a Hudson County Community College delegation participated in a Title IX certification course at Mercer County Community College alongside colleagues from the other 18 New Jersey community colleges. The course was presented by The National Center for Higher Education Risk Management. The HCCC delegation included Paula Gonzalez, Human Resources Manager; Yeurys Pujols, Director of Enrollment and Student Services (North Hudson Center); Rafael Nivar, Director of Campus Safety and Security; Michael Reimer, Dean of Student Services; Lilisa Williams, Assistant to the Vice President for Academic Affairs; and Veronica Zeichner, Chief Financial Officer.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FIRMÓ ACUERDO DE DOBLE ADMISIÓN CON RUTGERS UNIVERSITY-NEWARK

os graduados de Hudson County Community College tendrán una opción más para obtener sus grados de bachiller, ya que la Universidad ha iniciado un programa de doble admisión con Rutgers University – Newark (RU-N). La firma de este acuerdo se llevó a cabo el pasado Miércoles, 8 de Abril, donde el Dr. Glen Gabert, Presidente de HCCC estuvo acompañado de la Canciller de Rutgers University – Newark Nancy Cantor, Ph.D.

El acuerdo facilitará la transferencia de estudiantes de HCCC, que se gradúen con un grado de asociado, a RU-N con estatus de junior (tercer año). El acuerdo también proveer un transferencia en reverso" en la cual estudiantes de RU-N pueden transferir a HCCC a obtener sus grados de asociado, aun cuando ya se hayan graduado de RU-N.

Otras provisiones del acuerdo son las de proveer consejería académica y consejería de asistencia financiera para estudiantes que estén considerando transferencia a RU-N, y explorar las posibilidades de recaudación de fondos en conjunto, para becas que ayuden a estudiantes que transfieran a RU-N.

El Dr. Gabert, hizo notar que este acuerdo proviene de las relaciones ya establecidas con RU-N que han incluido otros acuerdos de articulación y colaboraciones.

"A través de los años, hemos trabajado con Rutgers University – Newark para proveer a estudiantes de HCCC de maneras de obtener sus bachilleratos, que los llevará a un futuro más exitoso," dijo el Dr. Gabert. "Este acuerdo de doble admisión permitirá que nuestros estudiantes obtengan sus grados de bachiller en Artes, Biología, Negocios, Artes de Computador, Justicia Criminal, Inglés, Estudios Ambientales, Administración Pública, y Teatro."

La Canciller de RU-N Nancy Cantor, ve metas múltiples y comunes a alcanzarse con esta extensa relación con HCCC: "Esta asociación expande significativamente y fortalece, las rutas de educación entre las dos instituciones. Facilitando la transición mediante acuerdos de articulación y empleando mecanismos innovadores en asistencia financiera y completación de grados, refleja un elemento clave de nuestro plan estratégico, de invertir en colaboraciones con instituciones anclas, incrementando el acceso a la obtención de grados en RU-N, a bajo costo, para estudiantes de nuestra región. También habla directamente de nuestra

prioridad nacional de incrementar las oportunidades de obtener un grado universitario."

El Dr. Gabert dijo además que la Junta de Administradores de Hudson County Community College, aprobó una recomendación de proveer de becas a Rutgers University – Newark, con la creación de la Beca Debra y Marvin Greenberg Rutgers Scholarship. Esta medida amerita que la administración de HCCC iguale la adjudicación de la Fundación de HCCC para la beca, que será dada a estudiantes graduados de HCCC que asistirán a Rutgers University – Newark, de \$2,500 cada año, por dos años.

Marvin Greenberg, se retiró como Vicepresidente Ejecutivo de Rutgers University en 1992. Luego trabajando con el Dr. Glen Gabert (en aquel entonces nuevo Presidente de HCCC) en el desarrollo de un plan estratégico para Hudson County Community College, titulado "Blueprint for the Future (Plan para el Futuro), que contenía direcciones básicas que se convertirían en el renacimiento de HCCC. Luego de completar este proyecto Greenberg y su esposa Debra establecieron un endorso en Rutgers para proveer apoyo a graduados de HCCC que asistan a Rutgers University – Newark.

APPLICATION PERIOD FOR HUDSON COUNTY **GOVERNMENT SCHOLARSHIP TO OPEN MAY 1**

🖥 ach year, the Hudson County Executive and the Board of Chosen Freeholders will fund merit- and need-based scholarships that will provide support for tuition and fees to students pursuing an HCCC degree on a full-time basis. Each scholarship is renewable for up to six semesters (three years), provided the applicant remains in good academic standing.

Scholarship Guidelines and Eligibility Requirements

- Applicants must reside in Hudson County to be considered for scholarship eligibility. Currently enrolled students may apply.
- Applicants must meet the standard admission requirements set forth by the College (see HCCC catalog).
- Applicants must enroll as full-time students at Hudson County Community College.
- · Applicants must submit a financial aid application to the College, although it is not a requirement to submit the form to the state or federal government.
- Scholarship recipients must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.75 to maintain scholarship eligibility. Should a student's GPA fall below the minimum requirement, s/he will have a one-semester grace period to bring the GPA up to the required minimum. Should the student fail to bring the GPA up to the required minimum at the end of the grace period, the student will lose scholarship eligibility.

This scholarship may not be applied to prior balances.

Applications may be submitted beginning on May 1. The annual deadline for complete scholarship applications is Aug. 1st. (Should that date fall on a day when the College is closed, the deadline will be the first day that the College is open after Aug. 1).

ESL BLISS AT THE THEATER – A TRIP TO NEW YORK CITY

"What is going to happen now?" said the actress at the end of Katherine Mansfield's *Bliss*, at the Clarion Theater in New York City on Thursday, March 26. That was a line in the script of this adaptation, but also the question that the presenter asked the attentive and amused audience in the theater – entirely made of ESL students and chaperones like myself.

"Maybe she will leave her husband," one student said from the audience.

"She should leave her husband. He is with another woman!" another student said, indignant.

"Divorce him!" shouted others in the audience, amused and outraged.

At the end of the performance, students were also given the chance to ask the actors, still in character, questions. Bertha Young, the protagonist of *Bliss*, seems happy with her married and social life until she finds out that her husband has been cheating on her with one of her guests at her dinner party.

"Divorce?..." was the character's dubious answer, among the laughs and protests of the very engaged and heated audience.

In the same way, "The Garden Party," the second adapted short story by the same author, ended with the words, "isn't life ... isn't life ... Isn't it?"

"Do you think life is too short?" a brave student in the front row asked.

Such a simple question, but what a complex answer... what is life? Is death really part of life? Is life fair? Should the garden party go on?

Despite the complexity of these stories, the ESL students in the audience, even the beginners, were able to grasp their essence, and to provide answers and comments to the presenter's questions that were only apparently simple. The Educational Theater of New York's secret is to break down the acting by interrupting the narration after brief acts and asking questions to the students. The audience is asked if they want to repeat the scene or if they wish to continue after the clarification they get by the presenter and other students. They are free to answer from their seats, and they have fun doing so. They are also more engaged, not only

because they actually understand what is happening, but also because they know they will be asked questions at the end of each scene.

During this very enjoyable show, the students can practice their listening and speaking skills, but they are also given an insight on literature pieces, history, and real life acting, all while also conquering the frontiers of New York City, which is more foreign than one may suspect for at least a part of our ESL population.

As for me, I got to work in collaboration with Colleen Dallavalle and the Office of Student Activities to make sure our students had their seats



Marketing and Supply Chain Management, Criminal Justice, English, Environmental Science, Public and Nonprofit Administration, and Theatre."

RU-N Chancellor Nancy Cantor sees multiple and mutual goals to be achieved in this more expansive relationship with HCCC: "This exciting partnership will significantly broaden and strengthen educational pathways between our two institutions. Smoothing transitions through articulation agreements and employing innovative financial aid and mutual degree-completion mechanisms reflects a key element of our strategic plan priority to invest in anchor institution collaborations by increasing access to and affordability of earning an RU-N degree for students in our region. It also speaks directly to our national priority to increase opportunities for earning a college degree."

Dr. Gabert said that last month, the Hudson County Community College Board of Trustees passed a recommendation to provide matching scholarships to Rutgers University - Newark with

the institution of the Debra and Marvin Greenberg Rutgers Scholarship. This measure calls for the HCCC administration to match the grant to the HCCC Foundation for the Greenberg scholarships that award HCCC graduates who will attend Rutgers University - Newark \$2,500 per year for two years.

Marvin Greenberg retired as Executive Vice President of Rutgers University in 1992. At that time, the New Jersey Chancellor for Higher Education Dr. Edward Goldberg and Hudson County retained him to work with the new President of Hudson County Community College, Dr. Gabert, in developing a strategic plan. Titled "Blueprint for the Future," Greenberg's report set out the basic directions for what turned out to be the renaissance of HCCC. At the completion of his project, Marvin Greenberg and his wife Debra established an endowment at Rutgers to provide support for graduates from HCCC to attend Rutgers University at the Newark campus.

n Monday, April 20, 2015, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) was one of just four community colleges in the United States to be recognized for its diversity initiatives by the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC).

HCCC President Glen Gabert, Ph.D. accepted the honor at the 2015 Awards of Excellence presentation during a gala at the AACC annual convention in San Antonio, Texas. The AACC Awards of Excellence finalists were selected by the AACC Board of Directors, and the honors were presented by AACC President and CEO Dr. Walter G. Bumphus and AACC Board of Directors Chair Dr. Ken Atwater (President of Hillsborough Community College, FL).

The AACC Advancing Diversity category recognizes colleges that are dedicated to increasing diversity and advocating for social equity on their campuses and in the community. The makeup of the student body at Hudson County Community College is 57% female, 55% Hispanic, 14.88% Black/African-American, 11.02% white, and 7.35% Asian. HCCC students were born in 119 different countries and speak more than 29 different languages.

"Every department and division of our College – as well as our Board of Trustees, our elected officials and our generous Foundation supporters – works to ensure that attaining a college education is not just a possibility but a reality for every Hudson County resident, regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, age, physical ability, gender preference or sexual orientation," Dr. Gabert said. "We are devoted to ensuring that we are successful in fulfilling this goal."

Among the initiatives Hudson County Community College utilizes are those that seek to dispel or diminish language and affordability barriers

to higher education, and promote understanding and acceptance of all students and all members of the community. "The diversity of our community and student body is enriching on so many levels. We are proud to have been honored with this recognition, which shines a light on everyone at the College and all who work with us in these efforts," Dr. Gabert stated.





n Thursday, April 16, students in Hudson County Community College's Theatre Arts program had an opportunity to practice the Alexander Technique - a method of mindful movement - with actor and performer Gary Ramsey.

In describing the Alexander Technique to the students, Ramsey explained that people interfere with their own movement and vocalization. A common tension-inducing practice, said Ramsey, is freezing the joint at the top of the spine which is connected to the brain.

The Alexander Technique is named after Frederick Matthias Alexander, an actor who discovered a solution to his laryngitis after physicians could not find a cause. Alexander found that excess tension in his neck and body were the source and he sought ways to move and speak with greater ease.

Ramsey led the students through several exercises, including relaxation. "When we are tense," said Ramsey, "we are contracted and do not perform well."


