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# HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE RECEIVES 2024 HIGHER EDUCATION EXCELLENCE IN DIVERSITY HEALTH PROFESSIONS AWARD

he Hudson County Community College (HCCC) School of Nursing and Health Professions has been presented with the 2024 Higher Education Excellence in Diversity (HEED) Health Professions Award from *Insight Into Diversity* magazine. The award is a national honor recognizing United States colleges and universities offering health programs that demonstrate an outstanding commitment to diversity and inclusion. HCCC is the sole community college in the United States to receive this award.

"Hudson County Community College is proud to stand shoulder-to-shoulder with the 70 institutions receiving this award that offer baccalaureate, master's and doctoral degrees," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "We are keenly aware of the important role our School of Nursing and Health Professions plays in addressing the healthcare workforce shortage by offering courses in a broad range of fields and providing students with the resources and support they need to succeed."

"The HEED Health Professions Award process includes a comprehensive and rigorous application with questions relating to the

recruitment and retention of students and employees — and best practices for both; continued leadership and support for diversity; and other aspects of campus diversity and inclusion," said Lenore Pearlstein, publisher of *Insight Into Diversity* magazine. "We take a detailed approach to reviewing each application in deciding who will be named a Health Professions HEED Award recipient. Our standards are high, and we look for schools where diversity and inclusion are woven into the work being done every day across their campus."

Insight Into Diversity magazine selected the HCCC School of Nursing and Health Professions in recognition of the College's focus on recruiting and retaining traditionally underrepresented and first-generation college students. The College was recognized specifically for the following initiatives and outcomes:

• Partnering with organizations that work with underserved, underrepresented, disadvantaged, and minority populations.

# **HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HONORED WITH 2024 NATIONAL** AWARD AS A 'DIVERSITY CHAMPION'

ne might expect that promoting diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) would come as second nature to a community college serving one of the most vibrant and ethnically diverse communities in the United States. But according to Insight Into Diversity magazine, to "champion" DEI, an educational institution must continually lead, support, and foster an environment where everyone - students, faculty, staff, stakeholders and the surrounding community - is valued, recognized, and made to feel they belong.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) received the Higher Education Excellence in Diversity (HEED) Award from Insight Into Diversity magazine. The national honor recognizes United States colleges and universities that demonstrate an unwavering commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion.

While this is HCCC's fourth year in a row receiving the accolade, it is the first time the College has been designated as a "Diversity Champion," defined as a higher education

# HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION ART COLLECTION HONORS NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

The Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation Art Collection is proud to honor Native American artists and celebrate their work during National Native American Heritage Month, which takes place in November.

The HCCC Foundation Art Collection features over 100 works of art by Native American and Indigenous artists, in addition to dozens of prominent works depicting Native Americans and the Native American experience. The pieces of Native American art are included in the more than 2,000 original works in the Collection permanently installed in all HCCC campus buildings.

While some people think of Native American art as a relic from a long-distant past, the Native American art in the Foundation Art Collection spans many centuries, from tools and artifacts of the pre-Columbian era to modern works by some of today's prominent Native American artists.

The Exhibit features a large collection of hand-carved stone tools from the Lenni Lenape people. The tools were found in a farmer's field, so their exact date of origin and purpose cannot be known for certain because the Lenni Lenape have lived in this area for over 10,000 years. The objects include what are believed to be stone arrowheads, hand axes, fire starters, and more. Seeing and even touching these tools while on a guided tour is a unique opportunity for students and others to connect with the past and imagine what life was like in this region thousands of years ago.

The Collection is also home to many photographs by renowned photographer Edward S. Curtis depicting Native Americans after the turn of the 19th century. Curtis was awarded a \$75,000 grant (worth about \$2.5 million today) by legendary American financier J.P. Morgan to travel the country for 20 years, taking over 40,000 photographs of Native Americans at a time when their traditional way of life was under threat. Curtis also documented and recorded languages, history, folklore, and music of the tribes with which he interacted. While some aspects of this work may be considered controversial by modern standards, it's important to note that if not for his painstaking work, the history, languages, and memories of many of these people and cultures would be lost. Kiowa and Cherokee novelist, poet and National Medal of Arts recipient N. Scott Momaday stated, "Taken as a whole, the work of Edward S. Curtis is a singular achievement. Never before have we seen the Indians of North America so close to the origins of their humanity . . . . Curtis' photographs comprehend indispensable images of every human being at every time in every place."

Dr. Andrea Siegel, Curator of the HCCC Foundation Art Collection, recalls how an HCCC student of Native American and Hispanic heritage told her that he felt a strong connection with one portrait in particular because he felt like it could be one of his ancestors. To Siegel, it was a reminder that art connects us across culture and time, and that the HCCC Foundation Art Collection is a living art museum that resonates with students in powerful ways every day.

While the stone tools of the Lenni Lenape and the photos by Curtis remind us of our nation's past, more recent works by prominent Native American artists like Jaune Quickto-See Smith, Fritz Scholder, and Terran Last Gun speak to the modern experience. Like many of the pieces discussed above, Jaune Quickto-See Smith's What

is an American, Fritz Sholder's Self Portrait with Dark Glasses, and an untitled serigraph by Terran Last Gun can be viewed at the Gabert Library on 71 Sip Avenue.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber stated, "We are proud to honor Native American artists. Their works invite us to reflect on our shared history and remind us of the importance of preserving and honoring these Indigenous voices today."

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
- Striving to incorporate culturally responsive concepts throughout the curricula and developing new programs to align with current trends and labor market needs.

# RONNIE SEVILLA TO LEAD HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION

here's a new Chair at the Hudson County Community College Foundation, but he's not new to serving others or to the value of education.

Ronnie Sevilla steps into the leading role of Foundation Chair after serving as Treasurer and as a dedicated member of the Foundation Board for nearly a decade.

Sevilla brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to this role. He is currently the Vice President and a Cash Management and Sales Officer at Spencer Savings Bank. Sevilla previously worked at Investors Bank (now part of Citizens Financial) where he helped lead the bank's expansion into Jersey City and Hudson County.

Sevilla holds a Bachelor of Arts in Economics degree from Rutgers University and earned an Executive MBA from Rutgers Business School. His experience in business school played a large part in forming his views about the importance of education. Sevilla states, "Look at me. I went back to grad school as an adult learner to pursue my MBA. I loved the experience, and I'm a better person for it. I want everyone to have the opportunity to experience the lifechanging effect of a college education."

The new Foundation Chair also believes that education creates social and economic mobility in the community, pointing out that "Education is the gift that keeps on giving; it's intergenerational. A college education helps people break the cycle and empowers them to have more control over their future."

Sevilla knows this firsthand. He was born in the United States to parents from Ecuador. At age eight, he and his family moved back to Ecuador, and he returned to the U.S. as a teenager, so he can relate to the immigrant experience that is especially relevant in Hudson County, one of the most culturally diverse counties in the United States. He stated, "I truly believe with all my heart that the United States is the greatest country in the world because it offers the most social and economic opportunity. Education is the great equalizer and the key to unlocking that opportunity."

### Welcoming the New ACCESS Cohort: Transformative Pathways to Independence

On September 9, the Center for Adult Transition, partially funded by County College-Based Centers for Adult Transition Grant, proudly welcomed an eighth cohort of students into the ACCESS program, embarking on a journey that promises to be both immersive and transformative. The ACCESS program is designed to bridge the gap between high school and adulthood, offering a unique blend of fundamental academic and workplace skills through a precollege preparation and workforce transition program that also provides the needed support for young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD).

Since its inception at the School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development, the Center for Adult Transition has served 29 ACCESS alumni, with 55% enrolling at HCCC or other two- or four-year colleges and 35% in internship opportunities. What makes this program stand out is its differential teaching structure, which tailors learning to the individual strengths and needs of each student. Through hands-on experiences, personalized mentorship, and real-world practice, students

are empowered to take charge of their futures in both educational and vocational settings.

This Fall 2024 cohort will engage in a variety of dynamic learning environments, including classroom instruction, virtual reality and simulations, all while developing essential life skills. These students will be equipped with the tools they need to thrive in higher education or the workforce, gaining confidence, independence, and a sense of purpose.

inclusion each and every day, and incorporate those shared values in all we do."

According to Lenore Pearlstein, publisher of Insight Into Diversity magazine, "The HEED Award selection process consists of a comprehensive and rigorous application that includes questions relating to the recruitment and retention of students and employees - and best practices for both; leadership support for diversity, campus culture and climate; supplier diversity, and many other aspects of campus diversity and inclusion. We take a detailed approach to reviewing each application in deciding who will be named a HEED Award recipient. Our standards are high, and we look for institutions where diversity and inclusion are woven into the work being done every day across their campus."

HCCC's 2024 HEED Award recognizes practices and programs making Hudson County Community College a visionary leader that sets DEI standards for other campus communities while ensuring that HCCC students successfully achieve their academic goals. These include, but are not limited to:

- HCCC President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI), established by Dr. Reber in 2019, that includes students, faculty, staff, alumni, trustees, and external community members who develop partnerships and collaborations, playing an essential role in establishing and implementing DEI goals for an inclusive institutional community.
- HCCC Office for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion that oversees Accessibility Services, Cultural Affairs, Veterans Affairs, International Student Services, and the College's Title IX processes. The Office of DEI also leads and supports annual programs that engage HCCC students, faculty, staff, and community members, including a 9/11 Memorial, MLK Memorial, Juneteenth Celebration, and the College's annual DEI Summer Retreat.
- "Hudson Helps Resource Center" that provides essential services and resources focusing on basic needs beyond the classroom and including a Care Team, food pantries, nutritional counseling, assistance with SNAP applications, Career Closet, emergency financial assistance, Chromebook loaners, social services and mental health counseling, and "Single Stop" benefits screening.
- "Hudson Scholars," winner of the national 2024 Bellwether Legacy Award and 2021-22 League for Innovation in the Community College's Innovation of the Year Award, that provides proactive advisement,

financial stipends, and early academic intervention to ensure a greater number of students facing financial challenges, language barriers, employment concerns, and family responsibilities complete their college education, achieve their goals, and realize their dreams. Since its inception, the number of students served has increased from 800 to more than 3,000.

- HCCC English as a Second Language Program that offers various pathways for students to master English while learning, quickly advancing through their developmental education requirements, and accumulating credits that enable them to complete their associate degree studies and graduate sooner. More than 1,000 students are served every fall and spring at the College.
- HCCC First Year Experience program that helps students transition into college smoothly, providing opportunities to become acquainted with fellow students, faculty, and staff; receive financial assistance; orient to HCCC class schedules, programs and services; engage in the College Student Success course and acquire skills to achieve academically; and take advantage of assistance provided by HCCC Peer Leaders and Mentors.
- HCCC Summer Refresher Academy, the College's summer bridge program, that is offered free of charge to students who wish to improve basic skills, build confidence, and obtain higher course grades and finish their degrees more quickly.
- HCCC's focus on climate, culture, and community, addressing morale, salaries, and mutually respectful relationships among all employees. Dr. Reber conducts monthly Town Hall Meetings for faculty, staff, and students to stay informed and to communicate openly with one another.
- The College's DEI infrastructure with guidelines for best practices in recruitment, hiring, succession planning, safety, and professional development. Diversity, recruitment and retention are priorities in strategic planning, institutional frameworks, and budget development from the President and Board of Trustees to employee and student engagement at all levels and in all areas.
- HCCC's faculty and staff tuition-reimbursement program, providing access to a wide range of professional development opportunities including workshops, academic and certificate programs, and programs of inclusion and belonging. This past year, employees received a collective \$500,000 of College funding in support of their professional development.

"Dr. Lowe is an asset to the Hudson County Community College family," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "We are proud that HACU selected him for the Enlace program. Throughout his career in higher education, Dr. Lowe has championed student success, providing students transformative support and access to resources to achieve their academic and career goals."

Enlace sessions will be delivered through a series of online meetings, in-person sessions at HACU's Annual Conference in Aurora, Colorado, and at the April 2025 National Capitol Forum in Washington, D.C. The program will conclude with a graduation ceremony. Capital One and the Mellon Foundation provided grant funding for selected participants.

As a first-generation college student from Panama, Dr. Lowe learned to navigate higher education with the help of counselors and academic advisors who influenced his professional development. He has led and supported educational programs for 26 years, beginning his career at New Jersey City University (NJCU) as the first Student Support Services Academic Advisor.

Dr. Lowe received his Bachelor's degree in English/Secondary Education from NJCU; and his Master of Arts degree in Counseling, and Ph.D. in Counseling and Supervision from Kean University. He holds certifications in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion from Cornell University; and in Implicit Bias Training and Mental Health First Aid, among others.

Coinciding with National Hispanic Heritage Month, Dr. Lowe was honored with the Excellence in Higher Education award at the 49th Annual Hispanic State Parade of New Jersey. The event celebrated the contributions of Hispanic and Latino Americans in a vibrant display of culture, unity, and pride.

# Larry Anderson, HCCC Class of 2019 A.A., Liberal Arts

This month, HCCC Happenings spoke with Larry Anderson, an Admissions Recruiter at HCCC and a proud HCCC alumnus. If you're an HCCC student or alum, there's a good chance you've interacted with Larry or seen him around campus, and his enthusiasm for HCCC and the success of its



students is infectious. Outside of work, Larry enjoys karaoke and spending time with family.

Before coming to HCCC, Larry worked for the largest textile workers union in the country and also worked at a non-profit advocating for the parents of children with behavioral issues. He earned a B.A. in Sociology from New Jersey City University (NJCU).

### What inspired you to pursue a College education after already having a career in place?

I worked as a coordinator at a non-profit organization for 12 years, a role just below the executive director. Despite training seven different directors, I was never considered for the position because I lacked a degree. I decided it was time to earn one.

### What led you to choose HCCC?

My wife, who works for a GED program, frequently interacted with HCCC by sending her students there. She suggested I explore what HCCC had to offer.

### What made HCCC the right choice for you?

When recruiting high school students, I often share how HCCC helped me realize that social work wasn't my true calling. Social work is outcome-based, and the field often faces high burnout and turnover rates. I was constantly hiring new employees, which made me reconsider my career path.

### What advice would you give to other adult learners/nontraditional students looking to follow in your footsteps?

Returning to school was daunting because I feared failure and not being able to keep up with younger students. However, I put those fears aside and took the plunge. The staff and faculty at HCCC were incredibly welcoming and reassuring, which made all the difference.

### After you went to HCCC, you earned a degree in Sociology from New Jersey City University (NJCU). What got you interested in that

When I started my Sociology program at NJCU, I was unsure if I wanted to continue toward becoming a social worker. During the pandemic, I worked part-time as a manager at the North Hudson Campus food pantry, distributing food and Chromebooks for online learning. Seeing students succeed and graduate made me realize that working in higher education generated much better outcomes.

### How did it feel to graduate from NJCU alongside your son?

My son wasn't initially enthusiastic about college. He started at NJCU in Fall 2017 and took longer than expected to finish. My enrollment at NJCU motivated him, turning it into a friendly competition. As a result, we graduated together, which was a proud moment for both of us.

### Tell us about being an admissions recruiter at HCCC.

Before becoming an admissions recruiter, I worked with the EOF Office as a retention specialist. During that time, I attended high school college fairs with admissions recruiters and realized that helping students enroll at HCCC was my passion. When a position opened up, my colleagues spoke highly of me, and I joined the HCCC family.
